INTRODUCTION



Baku State University (BSU) adopts a strategic, inclusive, and socially responsible approach toward advancing Sustainable Development Goal 1 – No Poverty within the framework of the United Nations’ sustainable development agenda. Recognizing that poverty remains one of the most significant global challenges affecting social stability, economic

development, and equal access to opportunities, the university positions higher education as a powerful instrument for breaking the cycle of poverty and promoting sustainable human development. By ensuring equitable access to quality education, fostering inclusive policies, and strengthening community engagement, BSU contributes to national and global efforts aimed at reducing poverty and improving social well-being.

Access to higher education is widely acknowledged as a key driver of social mobility and economic empowerment. In this context, BSU implements a comprehensive system of financial and institutional support designed to eliminate economic barriers that may prevent talented individuals from pursuing university studies. These mechanisms include state-funded scholarships, merit- and need-based financial aid, tuition waivers, and subsidized student housing. Through these measures, the university ensures that students from low-income families, rural areas, and socially vulnerable groups are provided with equal opportunities to access and successfully complete higher education. By prioritizing inclusivity and affordability,

Beyond direct financial support, BSU integrates poverty reduction perspectives into its academic and research activities. The university actively encourages its academic staff and researchers to investigate socio-economic inequalities, develop innovative policy recommendations, and contribute to evidence-based strategies aimed at reducing poverty. Faculty members engage in interdisciplinary research addressing issues such as income inequality, regional development, labor market challenges, and social protection systems. Through partnerships with government institutions, civil society organizations, and international bodies, BSU scholars contribute their expertise to initiatives designed to promote inclusive growth and sustainable development both within Azerbaijan and in the broader international context.

BSU also recognizes that universities play an essential role not only as educational institutions but also as agents of social transformation. Through community outreach programs, public lectures, training workshops, and knowledge-sharing platforms, the university actively extends its expertise beyond the academic environment. These initiatives aim to equip local communities, young professionals, and vulnerable groups with practical skills, entrepreneurial knowledge, and educational opportunities that enhance employability and economic resilience. By strengthening the link between academic knowledge and real-world societal needs, BSU helps foster a culture of empowerment, innovation, and sustainable development.

Through the integration of inclusive education policies, research-driven solutions, and active social engagement, BSU contributes to long-term efforts aimed at poverty alleviation and sustainable development. By empowering individuals through knowledge, expanding opportunities for disadvantaged groups, and supporting evidence-based policy development, the university reinforces its commitment to advancing global sustainability goals.

In this way, BSU not only supports the academic success and well-being of its students but also plays a significant role in promoting social equity, economic inclusion, and sustainable societal progress in alignment with the principles and objectives of the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals.

NO POVERTY (SDG 1)

Baku State University (BSU) is a state university in Azerbaijan, and in addition to paid education, there are also seats which are allocated under the state order. These state-funded places are provided within the national higher education admission system and represent an important mechanism for ensuring equitable

access to university education. Such seats are taken by students who pass through the national competition for free education, gaining more points than their competitors in the centralized admission examinations, regardless of their material well-being. In this way, the system ensures that academically strong applicants are able to pursue higher education without the financial burden of tuition fees.

BSU is a state university, and in addition to paid education, there are also seats which are allocated under the state order. These places play an important role in expanding access to higher education and supporting talented students across the country. They are awarded to applicants who successfully pass the competitive admission process for free education by achieving higher examination scores than other candidates, irrespective of their socio-economic status or financial background. As a result, the allocation of these state-funded places promotes merit-based access to education and enables capable students to continue their academic development at the university without financial constraints.

In accordance with the Accommodation Policy, some students at Baku State University can count on a place in the university dormitory, which is located within walking distance from the main buildings. When considering applications, one of the main



criteria for allocating places in a dormitory is the financial need of the student. It should be noted that the cost of living in this hostel is lower than the regional average, and it should also be noted that there are no provisions for travelling to the university and back.

The university provides free legal and psychological support to all students and teachers if they apply.

BSU Ranks in the Top 600 in the Times Higher Education Impact Rankings 2025

Baku State University (BSU) has been ranked among the top 600 universities globally according to the 2025 “Impact Rankings” published by Times Higher Education (THE), one of the world's most prestigious ranking agencies. The university secured a position in the 401–600 range, marking a significant improvement from last year’s 1001–1500 range.



BSU's overall performance score increased by 35%, rising from 53.2 to 71.8 — a reflection of the university’s strategic reforms and initiatives in the field of sustainable development.

BSU placed in the global top 100 universities for four SDGs: SDG 1 (No Poverty), SDG 4 (Quality Education), SDG 5 (Gender Equality), and SDG 10 (Reduced Inequalities). Additionally, the university ranked in the 101–200 range for

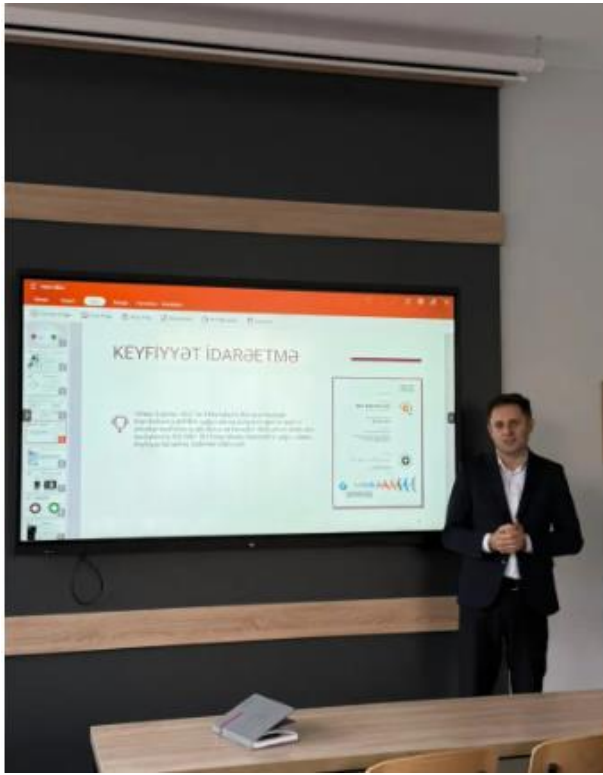

A scientific seminar will be held organized by BSU within the framework of the Baku Climate Action Week

On September 30, the Baku Climate Action Week (BCAW) (<https://bakuclimateactionweek.org/>) commenced. Running until October 4, the

BCAW has been organized in collaboration with the London Climate Action Week as a preparatory event for the 29th Session of the Conference of the Parties (COP-29) to the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change, which will take place in Baku this November. The event aims to create an important platform to engage the public in climate change-related activities and mobilize global efforts in the fight against climate change.

As part of the Baku Climate Action Week, a scientific conference on "Accelerating Research and Collaboration for Climate Action" will be held on



October 4, 2024, at 10:00 AM at the JW Marriott hotel, organized by Baku State University (BSU).

The main topics of the conference will focus on the scientific and practical aspects of climate change. Discussions will include the importance of empirical data, artificial intelligence, and advanced analytical tools for making significant progress in climate action, the impact of climate change on transboundary water resource management, new approaches and international cooperation mechanisms in this regard, as well as the synergy of joint initiatives at the international level and relevant global and regional cooperation opportunities.

There will be extensive discussions around the main topics of the conference:

1. Role of Artificial Intelligence and Advanced Analytical Tools: The conference will discuss the use of artificial intelligence technologies for predicting climate change and combating it. The processing of empirical data

and advanced analytical tools play a key role in more accurate and rapid climate change forecasting and the effective implementation of climate policies. Discussions will focus on the applications of artificial intelligence in climate modeling, the analytical processing of large data sets, and ways to make optimal decisions based on real-time data. This topic is also crucial for accelerating climate action on a global scale.

2. Impact on Transboundary Water Resource Management: Climate change significantly affects water resource management. It can alter the quantity and quality of water resources, creating problems in interregional and international water distribution. This conference will discuss new approaches and cooperation mechanisms for managing transboundary water resources. Regional cooperation is essential for addressing this issue, with a particular focus on the global conservation of water resources and their equitable distribution. Practical proposals will be presented for the fair and environmentally sustainable management of shared water resources among neighboring countries.
3. New International Cooperation Mechanisms and Synergistic Joint Initiatives: International cooperation in combating climate change will be a central theme. Since climate change is a global issue, it requires coordinated actions between countries. The conference will explore how joint initiatives can create more effective synergy, as well as ways to establish global and regional cooperation mechanisms in this direction. Specifically, the implementation of agreements reached under the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change, more efficient realization of countries' Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs), and the advancement of common climate goals at the global level will be key focus areas.

This comprehensive program will open opportunities for experience, research, and collaboration in the global fight against climate change and will be a significant step in the preparation for COP-29.

Within the framework of COP29, an event titled "Sustainable Development Goals and Universities: International Cooperation Experience" has been held

Within the framework of COP29, an event titled "Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and Universities: International Cooperation Experience" was held in the Green Zone, organized by Baku State University (BSU) and the "EcoSphere" Social-Ecological Center.



The moderator of the event, Shabnam Safarova, the advisor to the BSU rector on digitalization and information technologies, stated that the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), defined by the UN in 2015, are a universal call to address global challenges such as poverty, inequality, climate change, and quality education.

In their speeches, Asiman Ilyasov, the BSU rector's advisor on quality assurance, Fariz Guliyev, the head consultant of the International Projects Management Sector of the International Cooperation Department of the State Agency for Science and Higher Education, Latifa Nasibova, Acting Executive Director of the French-Azerbaijani University, and Ganira Mammadzade, head of the Strategic Planning Department at the Azerbaijan University of Architecture and Construction, highlighted that higher education institutions serve as innovation and knowledge centers, acting as catalysts for the SDGs. They emphasized that courses on sustainable development, climate action, and global health equip students with the knowledge and skills to solve real-world problems. They also pointed out that cross-border collaboration is essential to achieving the SDGs.

In his speech, BSU Rector Elchin Babayev discussed the impact of the SDGs on the overall activities of universities. He congratulated representatives of various

SDG FOCUSED RESEARCH

Poverty eradication remains a central global challenge and a prerequisite for sustainable development. As outlined in the United Nations' 2030 Agenda, SDG 1: No Poverty calls for ending poverty in all its forms everywhere, ensuring equal access to resources, opportunities, and social protection. Although significant progress has been achieved worldwide, poverty continues to hinder social inclusion, economic growth, and human capital development, particularly in regions facing structural inequalities, demographic shifts, and limited access to education and innovation.

For higher education institutions, including Baku State University (BSU), the relevance of SDG 1 extends beyond academic discourse; it involves contributing actively to research, teaching, community engagement, and policy development aimed at poverty reduction. Universities play a unique role as drivers of knowledge creation and dissemination, preparing graduates to address complex social challenges and shaping evidence-based solutions for inclusive development.

At BSU, the focus on SDG 1 aligns with its broader mission of fostering social responsibility, advancing human capital, and supporting Azerbaijan's national development strategies. Through multidisciplinary research, partnerships with government and international organizations, and outreach initiatives targeting vulnerable communities, BSU contributes to identifying the elshan causes of poverty and exploring innovative solutions. Furthermore, as part of its academic programs and student projects, BSU seeks to equip future professionals with the competencies necessary to design and implement sustainable poverty reduction strategies, thereby reinforcing the university's role in achieving SDG 1 both locally and globally.

1. Human Capital and Demographic Challenges in Azerbaijan

Authors: Teymurova V., Abdullayeva S., Dunyamaliyeva V., Bayramli Kh.

Focus: Utilisation of human capital in rural and urban Azerbaijan (2000–2024).

Methods: Demographic data analysis + expert interviews in HR management.

Findings:

- Shortage of skilled labour (30% rural, 35% urban).
- Ageing population (60+ will reach 15%).
- Risks for innovation, growth, and social protection.

Recommendation: Stronger collaboration between government, business, and education to enhance human capital.

- National income moderates effects.

Recommendation: Apply culturally sensitive approaches in studying inequality.

Recommendation: Improve investment climate for sustainable growth.

- Neonatal deaths improving slower.
- 1/3 of countries (esp. sub-Saharan Africa, South Asia) off track for SDG 3.2.

Recommendation: Invest in perinatal care, vaccination, health systems, equity.

Access to Higher Education

Approximately more than 75% of university students study for free, indicating a commitment to providing education regardless of financial circumstances.

State Scholarships

A substantial number of students receive state scholarships, further facilitating access to higher education

Financial Aid for Low-Income Students

The university provides financial aid to low-income students, supporting their pursuit of education

Inclusive Policies

Socially vulnerable groups, such as disabled individuals, refugees, and families who have lost a breadwinner, can access free education, ensuring a broader range of students can pursue higher education

Affordable Accommodation

BSU offers cost-effective dormitory accommodations, with a focus on financial need, reducing living expenses for students

Support Services

The university offers free legal and psychological support to all students and teachers, ensuring a supportive learning environment

Financial Support

Collaborating with the Union of Independent Students, BSU provides financial assistance to students in dire need and supports education lending programs. Tuition fee deferments are also available in certain cases
